TI FOUNDATION FOCUS

EDUCATION

The TI Foundation improves the quality of life in our community by providing knowledge, skills and programs that increase the percentage of high school graduates who are competent in math and science.

ARTS AND CULTURE

The foundation partners with arts and cultural organizations who define the perception of Dallas within our region, and with others who impact the business environment and quality of life in our communities.

COMMUNITY INVESTMENT PROGRAMS

The TI Foundation invests in organizations that improve the quality of life in TI plant site communities including:

- Capital or civic campaigns

MATCHING GIFTS

The foundation also has a matching gift program that encourages contributions by TI employees, retirees and directors to K-12 educational institutions, colleges and universities and arts and cultural organizations.

AP Incentive Program™

- The goal of this grant is to help additional schools maximize the number of students who pass AP exams.
- The number of students taking AP exams at 10 Dallas Independent School District (DISD) schools (math, science and English) has increased from 379 students in 1995 (the year before the incentive program began) to 4,093 students in 2007.
- The number of students passing the exams has increased from 157 students in 1995 to 1,466 students in 2007.
- The number of African-American and Hispanic students passing the exams has increased from 29 students in 1995 to 664 students in 2007.

Dallas ISD Summer Physics Program

- This grant supports a summer program targeting high school girls enrolled in their first physics class. The goal is to increase their confidence in working with concepts and equipment before entering the classroom.
- Number of female students passing physics exams:
 - 2002 – 17 percent
 - 2006 – 43 percent
 - 2007 – 41 percent

Dallas Achieves

- The Dallas Achieves grant supports the partnership of the National Center for Education Accountability and the Foundation for Community Empowerment.
- Through their partnership, these organizations started the Just for the Kids (JFTK) School Improvement Plan to transform the Dallas Independent School District.
- The Dallas Achieves' goal is to prepare graduating students for college entry and the workforce.
- To reach this goal Dallas Achieves will continue to:
 - Shift school focus on minimum. accountability standards to higher standards.
 - Establish and sustain high-quality instruction and operations across system levels (classroom, school, area and central administration).
 - Ensure all students reach college and career prepared benchmarks.
 - Facilitate continuous and focused school improvement planning using data, research and best-practice sharing.
- The 2007-2008 objectives are to engage 620 educators and campus leaders from 40 Dallas ISD schools in the JFTK School Improvement Service.

STEM AWARDS

Awards for outstanding teachers

- This grant honors secondary teachers in the Dallas, Richardson and Plano school districts who enhance student achievement and increase interest in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM).
- In spring 2007, members of the first class of 10 TI Foundation STEM Fellows received \$5,000 in cash awards and \$5,000 for professional development or educational technology use in their classrooms.
- The award-winning teachers also attended a day of professional development at TI.

UNIVERSITY OF NORTH TEXAS (UNT) DALLAS CAMPUS

Scholarships and program support

- Two major grants have been given. The first grant supported the completion of the University of North Texas' south Dallas campus. A second grant established the TI Math Scholars program to encourage students to seek bachelor degrees and teaching certificates in math. Recipients must agree to teach in a Dallas-area school district for a minimum of two years.
- In the fall 2007 semester (the first effort) the program enrolled 11 students in TI Math Scholars. An additional seven students are expected in the spring 2008 program, with 10 of the original 11 students continuing, resulting in a total of 17 TI Math Scholars.

SOUTHERN METHODIST UNIVERSITY

Infinity Project (SM)

- The TI Foundation has supported the Infinity Project since the original grant in 2006.
- The number of schools adopting the Infinity curriculum has increased by 31 percent since 2006 and now includes 275 certified schools. Texas had 21 new schools, and was the largest group in the program. As a result of the partnership between the University of Alabama and the University of Arizona, 10 additional Infinity schools have been accepted and trained in each state. Infinity is now in 37 states covering 74 percent of the U.S. The program is now international and includes groups from Australia, Israel, Lebanon and Portugal.
- During summer 2007, customized Infinity Project modules were included as part of a seven-week middle school engineering curriculum and incorporated into the Texas Pre-Freshman Engineering (TexPrep) Program. This curriculum is used throughout the state of Texas to enhance math, science and engineering skills for 6th to 8th grade students.
- SMU conducted a qualitative and quantitative assessment at 20 schools for three years. The first data will be available at the close of the 2007-2008 academic year. A pilot study conducted in 2006 showed a 20 percentage point gain in the passing rate of students taking the Infinity Project.

UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS AT SAN ANTONIO

Texas Pre-Freshman Engineering (TexPrep) Program

- This grant supports TexPREP, a seven-week summer academic enrichment program with curriculum for three consecutive years. TexPREP motivates and prepares middle and high school students for success in advanced studies. The program is intended to lead students to careers in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM).
- A follow-up survey from 2006 indicates:
 - Ninety-nine percent of TexPREP students graduate from high school.
 - Ninety-nine percent of TexPREP go to college.
 - Eighty-three percent graduate from college.
 - Forty-nine percent of the college graduates are STEM majors.
 - Seventy-nine percent of the college graduates are members of minority groups.
 - Seventy-five percent of the students are STEM graduates.
- TexPREP was included in the Science Education Compendium Best Practices K-12 prepared by Bayer Corporation in 2006.



ARTS & CULTURE

DALLAS MUSEUM OF ART

- The Center for Creative Connections grant is awarded for necessary technology infrastructure for museum-wide wireless learning environments and to enable innovative use of educational technologies.

WOMEN'S MUSEUM

- A grant was awarded to the Women's Museum to support their goal of being the nation's premier chronicler of women's history. Women's accomplishments are documented and celebrated through permanent and traveling exhibits, events and programs.

DALLAS ARBORETUM

- A grant was awarded for the construction of a Children's Exploration Garden. The garden helps children understand the importance of environment, water and energy preservation and the protection of other natural resources.

DALLAS SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA

- The Dallas Symphony Orchestra (DSO) endowment fund supports guest artists that rival the quality of performers who appear with the top-five American orchestras.
- The fund's goal is to significantly enhance the concert experience and grow the DSO audience.
- Another goal of the grant is to increase national and global recognition for the DSO.
- The grant seeks to have a strong impact on the local economic development.

DALLAS CENTER FOR THE PERFORMING ARTS

- This grant will help build a concert hall in the new Dallas Center for the Performing Arts, located in the Arts District of downtown Dallas. The Margaret McDermott Performance Hall is named after Margaret McDermott, wife of TI founder Eugene McDermott.

DALLAS OPERA

- This grant funds the School Performances Program which introduces students to opera and uses opera as the focus of effective integrated curricula in arts education. It has standardized testing objectives and provides knowledge about arts-in-education. This nationally acclaimed program reaches more than 10,000 students each year.



COMMUNITY INVESTMENT

AIDS INTERFAITH NETWORK

- This grant supports a coalition of four agencies (the Dallas Coalition of HIV/AIDS Services). The goal is to sustain the service capacity of ongoing programs due to the reduction of government grants.
- The grant will provide stable funding for programs serving more than 2,500 North Texas men, women, children and teens living with HIV/AIDS.

BIG BROTHERS, BIG SISTERS

- In partnership with Big Brothers, Big Sisters, this grant seeks to expand the ability of Dallas area public schools to use mentoring relationships for science and math education improvement.
- The grant helps improve the prospects for mentored children to pursue higher education in fields that enable them to find employment in technical careers.

SENIOR SOURCE

- This grant is in support of the “Coming of Age” capital campaign of the Senior Citizens of Greater Dallas.
- It will help build a new service center as a focal point for service and public awareness for senior citizens as well as present and future adult populations.

UNITED WAY

Destination: Graduation

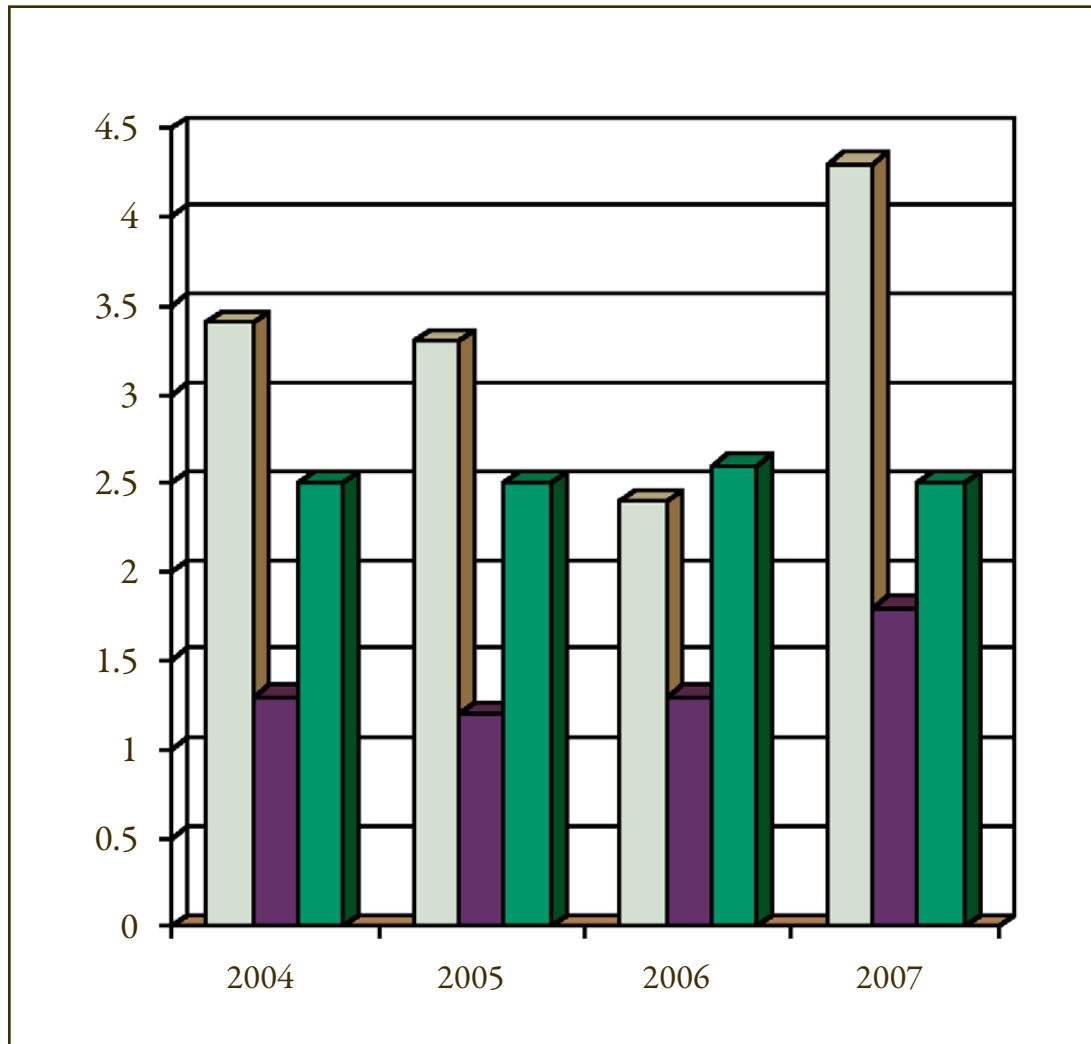
- This grant continues support of the Destination: Graduation program at W.W. Samuell High School (Dallas ISD) and expands the program to Williams High School and Plano East Senior High School (Plano ISD).
- Some of the findings of the program at W.W. Samuell have shown:
 - Destination: Graduation students are outperforming those not in the program in both reading and math;
 - Destination: Graduation students are closing the gap between Samuell and other Dallas ISD schools, with math scores improving to near the district average.

United Way in our Communities

- The TI Foundation’s annual contributions support goes to United Way in U.S. communities where TI has a major presence (Attleboro, MA; Dallas, TX; Houston, TX; Manchester, NH; San Jose, CA; Sherman, TX; Tucson, AZ; Warrenville, IL).
- The grant’s goal is to help build successful youth and families, create healthier communities and increase the group’s self-sufficiency.
