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LM5165EVM-HD-C50X EVM

The LM5165EVM-HD-C50X high density evaluation module (EVM) is designed to showcase the LM5165 high performance, exceptionally small, synchronous buck DC/DC buck converter with ultra-low no-load supply current. The module-style design is packaged in a miniature footprint with low component count. It operates over a wide input voltage range of 3 V to 65 V to deliver a fixed 5-V output with better than 2% setpoint accuracy. Low-dropout performance whenever the input voltage decreases below the output voltage setpoint is available with 100% duty cycle conduction of the high-side MOSFET. By virtue of the LM5165's constant on-time (COT) control scheme and diode emulation mode at light loads, the no-load supply current is only 12 μ A at 24-V input.

With integrated power MOSFETs, the LM5165 uses synchronous rectification to achieve high conversion efficiency over a wide load current range. Various features incorporated for enhanced reliability and safety include programmable cycle-by-cycle peak current limit, thermal shutdown protection, configurable soft-start, 1.212-V precision enable threshold, and open-drain PGOOD indicator for sequencing and fault reporting. With AEC-Q100 Q1 grade automotive qualification, the LM5165 is rated to operate over a junction temperature range of -40°C to +150°C. Input UVLO turn-on/off thresholds are set internally at 2.75 V and 2.45 V to protect the circuit at low input voltage conditions, and it is possible to tailor the minimum operating input voltage and hysteresis to the application requirements by suitable choice of input UVLO components.

The LM5165 and LM5165-Q1 are available in VSON-10 PowerPAD™ package with 3 x 3-mm² footprint to enable high density, low component count DC/DC solutions. Please consult the <u>LM5165 datasheet</u> for more information. The LM5165 is supported by WEBENCH® Power Designer and numerous PSPICE simulation models. Furthermore, the reader can use the <u>LM5165 Quick-start calculator</u> to optimize component selection and examine predicted efficiency performance across wide line and load ranges.

1 High Density EVM Description

The LM5165EVM-HD-C50X high density EVM is designed to use a regulated or non-regulated high-voltage input rail ranging from 3 V to 65 V to produce a tightly regulated output voltage of 5 V at load currents up to 150 mA. The wide input voltage range ("wide $V_{\rm IN}$ ") DC/DC solution offers outsized voltage rating and operating margin to deal with supply rail transient voltages. The output voltage is fixed at 5V using the LM5165's integrated high-resistance feedback divider to reduce circuit footprint, improve noise immunity, and achieve a lower no-load supply current. The power train passive components selected for this EVM, including filter inductor and ceramic input and output capacitors, are available with AEC-Q200 qualification for automotive applications.




Figure 1. LM5165 COT-controlled Buck Converter Schematics, (a) Fixed Output 3.3 V or 5 V, (b)

Figure 1(a) shows the schematic of a minimum parts count, fixed output voltage (3.3 V or 5 V), COT converter with continuous output current capability up to 150 mA. Figure 1(b) shows the schematic of a similar COT converter with output voltage adjustable using feedback resistors. Soft-start (SS), current limit (ILIM) and UVLO (EN and HYS) components are shown that are configurable as required by the specific application. The ripple voltage required at the FB pin is established using resistor R_{RIPPLE1} in series with the output capacitor.




Figure 2. LM5165 EVM Photo



5 Test Setup and Procedure

5.1 Test Setup

Table 2. EVM Connections

LABEL	DESCRIPTION
VIN	Positive input voltage power and sense connection
GND	Negative input voltage negative power and sense connection
VOUT	Positive output voltage positive power and sense connection
GND	Negative output voltage negative power and sense connection
ENABLE	ENABLE input – tie to GND to disable converter
PGOOD	Power Good output




Figure 3. EVM Test Setup

Referencing the EVM connections described in Table 2, the recommended test setup to evaluate the LM5165EVM-HD-C50X is shown in Figure 3. Working at an ESD workstation, make sure that any wrist straps, boot straps or mats are connected referencing the user to earth ground before power is applied to the EVM.

5.2 Test Equipment

Voltage Source: The input voltage source VIN should be a 0–65-V variable dc source capable of supplying 200 mA.

Multimeters:

- Voltmeter 1: Input voltage at VIN to GND. Set voltmeter to input impedance of 1 GΩ.
- Voltmeter 2: Output voltage at VOUT to GND. Set voltmeter to input impedance of 1 GΩ.
- Ammeter 1: Input current. Set ammeter to 1-second aperture time.
- Ammeter 2: Output current. Set ammeter to 1-second aperture time

Electronic Load: The load should be an electronic constant-resistance (CR) or constant-current (CC) mode load capable of 0 mAdc to 300 mAdc at 5 V. For a no-load input current measurement, disconnect the electronic load as it may draw a small residual current.

Oscilloscope: With the scope set to 20-MHz bandwidth and AC coupling, measure the output voltage ripple directly across an output capacitor with a short ground lead normally provided with the scope probe. Place the oscilloscope probe tip on the positive terminal of the output capacitor, holding the probe's ground barrel through the ground lead to the capacitor's negative terminal. It is not recommended to use a long-leaded ground connection because this may induce additional noise given a large ground loop. To measure other waveforms, adjust the oscilloscope as needed.

Safety: Always use caution when touching any circuits that may be live or energized.

5.3 Recommended Test Setup

5.3.1 Input Connections

- Prior to connecting the DC input source, it is advisable to limit the source current to 200 mA maximum.
 Ensure the input source is initially set to 0 V and connected to the VIN and GND connection points as shown in Figure 3. An additional high-ESR, low leakage, input bulk capacitor is recommended if long input lines are used.
- Connect voltmeter 1 at VIN and GND connection points to measure the input voltage.
- Connect ammeter 1 to measure the input current and set to at least 1-second aperture time.

5.3.2 Output Connections

- Connect an electronic load to VOUT and GND connections. Set the load to constant-resistance mode or constant-current mode at 0 mAdc before applying input voltage.
- Connect voltmeter 2 at VOUT and GND connection points to measure the output voltage.
- Connect ammeter 2 to measure the output current.

5.4 Test Procedure

5.4.1 Line and Load Regulation, Efficiency

- Setup the EVM as described above.
- Set load to constant resistance or constant current mode and to sink 0 mAdc.
- Increase input source from 0 V to 12 V, using voltmeter 1 to measure the input voltage.
- Using voltmeter 2 to measure the output voltage, V_{OUT}, vary the load current from 0 to 150 mAdc; V_{OUT} should remain within the load regulation specification.
- Vary input source voltage from 5.5 V to 65 V; V_{OUT} should remain within the line regulation specification.
- Decrease load to 0 mA. Decrease input source voltage to 0 V.



6 Test Data and Performance Curves




Figure 4. Converter Efficiency

Figure 4 through Figure 24 present typical performance curves for the LM5165EVM-HD-C50X based on the BOM presented in Table 3. Since actual performance data may be affected by measurement techniques and environmental variables, these curves are presented for reference and may differ from actual field measurements.




Figure 5. Load Regulation




Figure 6. SW Node Voltage, I_{OUT} = 150 mA; (a) V_{IN} = 12 V, (b) V_{IN} = 24 V (Ch2: SW)




Figure 7. SW Node Voltage, I_{OUT} = 150 mA; (a) V_{IN} = 48 V, (b) V_{IN} = 65 V (Ch2: SW)






Figure 8. SW Node Voltage, I_{OUT} = 20 mA; (a) V_{IN} = 12 V, (b) V_{IN} = 24 V (Ch2: SW)




Figure 9. SW Node Voltage, I_{OUT} = 20 mA; (a) V_{IN} = 48 V, (b) V_{IN} = 65 V (Ch2: SW) $^{(1)}$




Figure 10. V_{OUT} ripple: V_{IN} = 12 V; (a) I_{OUT} = 0 mA, (b) I_{OUT} = 150 mA




Figure 11. V_{OUT} ripple: V_{IN} = 24 V; (a) I_{OUT} = 0 mA, (b) I_{OUT} = 150 mA






Figure 12. V_{OUT} ripple: $V_{IN} = 65 \text{ V}$; (a) $I_{OUT} = 0 \text{ mA}$, (b) $I_{OUT} = 150 \text{ mA}$




Figure 13. Load Transient Response, V_{IN} = 12 V, 20 mA to 150 mA at 2 A/ μ s; (a) Load-on transient, (b) Load-off transient






Figure 14. Load Transient Response, V_{IN} = 24 V, 20 mA to 150 mA at 2 A/ μ s; (a) Load-on transient, (b) Load-off transient




Figure 15. Startup: V_{IN} = 12 V; (a) I_{OUT} = 0 mA, (b) I_{OUT} = 150 mA (Ch2: V_{IN} , Ch3: V_{OUT} , Ch4: I_{OUT})






Figure 16. Startup: V_{IN} = 24 V; (a) I_{OUT} = 0 mA, (b) I_{OUT} = 150 mA (Ch2: V_{IN} , Ch3: V_{OUT} , Ch4: I_{OUT})




Figure 17. Startup with 1.2 V Output Pre-bias: $I_{OUT} = 0$ mA; (a) $V_{IN} = 12$ V, (b) $V_{IN} = 24$ V (Ch2: V_{IN} , Ch3: V_{OUT} , Ch4: I_{OUT})






Figure 18. Startup with 2.5 V Output Pre-bias, $I_{OUT} = 0$ mA; (a) $V_{IN} = 12$ V, (b) $V_{IN} = 24$ V (Ch2: V_{IN} , Ch3: V_{OUT} , Ch4: I_{OUT})




Figure 19. Startup with 1 V Output Pre-bias, I_{OUT} = 150 mA; (a) V_{IN} = 12 V, (b) V_{IN} = 24 V (Ch2: V_{IN} , Ch3: V_{OUT} , Ch4: I_{OUT})




Figure 20. ENABLE On and Off: V_{IN} = 24 V; (a) I_{OUT} = 0 mA, (b) I_{OUT} = 150 mA (Ch2: V_{ENABLE} , Ch3: V_{OUT} , Ch4: I_{OUT})




Figure 21. ENABLE On and Off: V_{IN} = 24 V, I_{OUT} = 0 mA; (a) 1.8 V Output Pre-bias, (b) 3.3 V Output Pre-bias (Ch2: V_{ENABLE} , Ch3: V_{OUT} , Ch4: I_{OUT})






Figure 22. ENABLE On: V_{IN} = 24 V, I_{OUT} = 150 mA; (a) 1.8 V Output Pre-bias, (b) 3.3 V Output Pre-bias (Ch2: V_{ENABLE} , Ch3: V_{OUT} , Ch4: I_{OUT})



6.3.6 Line Transients – Automotive Cold-Crank

Various automotive cold-crank voltage profiles are applied to the input of the LM5165 converter. A cranking condition causes the battery voltage to drop to a low value when the battery is supplying current to an electric starter motor. The test pulses describe the drop of the battery voltage during cranking and subsequent recovery to the nominal operating voltage. Each automotive manufacturer has its own applicable standard.




Figure 23. Typical automotive cold-crank input voltage transient; I_{OUT} = 150 mA; (a) Profile 1, (b) Profile 2 (Ch2: V_{IN} , Ch3: V_{OUT} , Ch4: I_{OUT})




Figure 24. Typical automotive cold-crank input voltage transient; I_{OUT} = 150 mA; (a) Profile 3, (b) Profile 3 zoomed to show dropout operation when V_{IN} < 5V (Ch2: V_{IN} , Ch3: V_{OUT} , Ch4: I_{OUT})

The test pulses shown in Figure 23 and Figure 24 represent the drop in battery voltage and subsequent recovery. These waveforms are readily generated using the TI PMP7233 automotive cranking simulator design. Please consult the *Automotive Cranking Simulator User's Guide* SLVU984 for more detail.

6.4 CISPR 22 and CISPR 25 EMI Performance




Figure 25. CISPR 25 Class 5 Conducted Emissions Plot, 150 kHz to 30 MHz, V_{IN} = 13.5 V, I_{OUT} = 100 mA, (a) Unfiltered, (b) Filtered




Figure 26. CISPR 25 Class 5 Conducted Emissions Plot, 30 MHz to 108 MHz, V_{IN} = 13.5 V, I_{OUT} = 100 mA, (a) Unfiltered, (b) Filtered

Figure 25 represents the LM5165 COT converter's unfiltered and filtered EMI performance for conducted emissions over a frequency range of 150 kHz to 30 MHz using a 5-μH LISN according to the CISPR 25 specification. Figure 26 shows the measurement over a frequency range of 30 MHz to 108 MHz. CISPR 25 Class 5 peak and average limits are denoted in red. The yellow and blue spectra are measured using peak and average detection, respectively.




Figure 27. CISPR 22 Class B Conducted Emissions Plot, V_{IN} = 13.5 V, I_{OUT} = 100 mA, (a) Unfiltered, (b) Filtered

Figure 27 shows the measurement over a frequency range of 150 kHz to 30 MHz using a 50-μH LISN according to the CISPR 22 specification. CISPR 22 Class B limits are denoted in red.

A suitable EMI input filter to meet the specification limits is represented by a series inductor of 22 μ H together with an external input capacitance of 10 μ F (100 V, X7R, 1206 ceramic).




Figure 28. 5V, 150mA COT Schematic (Fixed 5V Output Version)




Figure 29. Top Copper (Top View)




Figure 30. Layer 2 (Top View)



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


Figure 31. Layer 3 (Top View)




Figure 32. Bottom Copper (Bottom View)



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


Figure 33. Top Assembly




Figure 34. Bottom Assembly




Figure 35. 3.3V, 50mA COT Schematic (Fixed 3.3V Output Version)




Figure 36. 5V, 25mA PFM Schematic (Adjustable Output Version)
